# Family Register.

My name is Franz Heinrich PETERS  
I was born in Rothenfelde Kingdom, Hanover,  
on Feb. 22, 1838.

My Parents were God fearing Religious People.

Grand Parents on my Father's side.

Grand Father's name was Caspar Heinrich  
born 1766, died 1809.

Grand Mother's name was Maria Katharine  
born 1773.

Name of Father's Brothers.

Heinrich Mathias, Frederick William, John Frederick,  
William Christof.

Grand Parents of Mother's side.

Grand Father's name was Mathias Pepe,  
born 1781, died 1824.

Grand Mother's name was Maria Katharine  
born 1772 her maiden name was Haemann.

My Father's name was Caspar Heinrich,  
born in Rothenfelde, August 31st, 1806 died May 8th, 1879.

My Mother's name was Louise, maiden name  
was Pepe born 1809 died July 8, 1885.

My Parents were married Oct 24, 1835.

F. H. Peters was the father of Emma L. (Peters) Baggerman  
and the grandfather of Wm. F. Baggerman

When about 18 years old I worked at my  
trade as a Candy maker in a factory on Market St.  
Among the fellow workmen was one whose name  
was Albert Haemmerl. This man was different  
from the other workers. He was a very good worker  
and acted friendly to everyone in the factory.  
But would not take part in anything unbecoming  
a Christian or a Gentleman. I soon got to know the  
man and I tried to live such a life as Haemmerl  
I noticed that he had something I failed to have.  
Having been reared by Godly Parents, the good Lord kept  
me from going astray altogether. My Parents prayers  
followed me wherever I went. I often felt this. I attended  
Church regularly, but I knew I was not right with God.

My Friend invited me one day to go with him to a  
revival meeting which was held in a Methodist Church  
which he attended. I consented and went with him  
every evening. God soon showed me, through His great  
mercy, that I was a sinner and that I needed  
a Saviour, but I could find no peace, till I began  
praying. So one night I made up my mind to  
keep on praying until the Lord would take the  
heavy burden of sin from me.

After leaving Church my good friend and  
myself entered the Candy Factory and went  
into a small closet, used for drying, for prayer.

I am the fifth child from my Parents  
Left home for St. Louis, Mo. America, on the  
30th day of August 1854. Arrived in St. Louis  
after a very stormy sea voyage Nov. 15th same year.

My first work in St. Louis I did, was to work  
in a candy factory on Market Street between 11th  
and 12th Streets for Mr. J. H. Blanke.

My next work was clerking in a Grocery store  
on N. Broadway for Robinson, Mar. 20, 1857 I left  
St. Louis for Second Creek, now called Bay, Mo  
Gazetteer Co. Here I clerked for my Brother in law  
Frank Peters for about two years then my Brother in law  
died. After this I with my sister Charlotte, widow of  
Frank Peters carried on the business, a General  
Country Store.

Feb. 17, 1863 I left Bay, Mo. for St. Louis, where  
Brother Fred and myself formed a Partnership.  
We bought a Grocery Store on the S. W. corner of 16<sup>th</sup> & Market.  
We were very successful.

This Store we commenced Feb. 27th, 1863 and sold  
out again with profit Aug 24th, 1865.

Nov. 30th, 1865 we opened a Dry Goods Store on  
the N. E. corner of Jefferson (now Clinton St.)  
Mar. 13, 1880. We bought a lot of 75 feet on the  
N. E. corner of 14th & Warren Sts. and for this  
we paid \$75.00 per front foot, \$4000 in Cash.

Built a Store and Flat on this lot in the summer of 1881 at the cost of \$13,571, for store fixtures we paid \$1,377.45. This house & lot not including fixtures we took out of Partnership and each Partner charged himself with \$7459.55.

Built a Store adjoining said property with a cost of \$5892.60. Each of the Partners paid one half of the cost.

Feb. 21, 1893, we bought house & lot fronting Warren Street adjoining our other property for \$2750.00 and paid for repairing same \$146.40. Dec. 30<sup>th</sup> each Partner charged himself with one half of the cost of this property, \$1748.30.

March 11<sup>th</sup> 1887, we formed a Stock Company under the name of Peters Dry Goods & Clothing Co. Capital Stock \$75,000.00

On March 13<sup>th</sup> same year, I sold all interest in the Store on Warren St., also in the houses adjoining our other property for \$27,000.00.

In Jan. 16, 1874 we bought lot on 13th. Moline St. for \$3960, built on this lot in the Fall of 1877 a house which cost \$3846.10. In the summer of 1878 we built a house on the front of 13th Street costing \$7718.40. On Jan. 20<sup>th</sup> I bought one half of this property for \$7500.00 which I later sold back again to my brother Fred for \$7500.00

On Aug 13<sup>th</sup>, 1886 bought Lot 37, 2104 & 2106 N. 13th St. from H. Wobbe for \$4228.00

Oct. 10<sup>th</sup> 1892 I bought a lot from Mr. Mayher at 2236 St. Louis Av. 40 feet at \$75 per front foot for \$3000 and then built house which cost \$10,065.21.

Bought on April 10th 1894 a lot at 3027 Ravinechew Avenue 28 ft @ \$100 front foot and then built a flat on same lot & house costing \$8112.75 Later I installed furnace & other conveniences costing \$1075.00 The house complete standing me \$9187.75.

July 1, 1902 bought lot at 2923 Dodier St. 50 feet costing \$1850.00. Built house same year at a cost of \$7068.68. June 3rd 1911 sold this property to my son Charles for \$8000.00

Jan. 1, 1889, we organized the Peter & Miller Shoe Co with a capital stock of \$140,000.00

Jan. 1, 1892 we reorganized and it then became the Peter Shoe Co. with a capital stock of \$200,000.

In December 1911 Peters Shoe Co. and Robert Johnson's Rand  
Shoe Co. consolidated and on Dec. 27th 1911 incorporated  
as the International Shoe Co. with a Capital Stock  
of \$35,000,000<sup>00</sup> of which \$31,000,000<sup>00</sup> was paid in and  
\$4,000,000<sup>00</sup> remaining as Treasury Stock.

Peters Shoe Co.'s stockholders received further capital  
stock (\$2,000,000<sup>00</sup>), \$7,500,000<sup>00</sup> in new stock.

\$13,750,000<sup>00</sup> Common Stock

\$8,250,000<sup>00</sup> Preferred Stock

\$ 31,000,000<sup>00</sup> Total.

In April 1st, 1861, I married Henriette Katharina Kowellenberg. My wife was born Dec. 17th 1841.

I appeal to the Lord to take the best of Grace & Mother to her three children, to Himself on Feb. 18, 1867.

August 20th, 1868 I married again to  
Elié Katharina Kowellenberg. died Oct. 13. 1930  
Her Father Rudolph was born Dec. 28. 1800 and died Aug. 6., 1868.

She was born July 17th 1801 and died Mar. 24, 1860.

He wrote me "Frank the Devil is still alive and not dead." I did not understand what he meant, but I found later that he was right in telling me that the Devil was still alive.

I have tried to live a Christian life for more than 50 years, but I have often found that I needed the Lord's help to lead me and keep me to live a life pleasing to him.

I know that only the Blood of Christ He spilt on Calvary can save me and bring me to Heaven.
